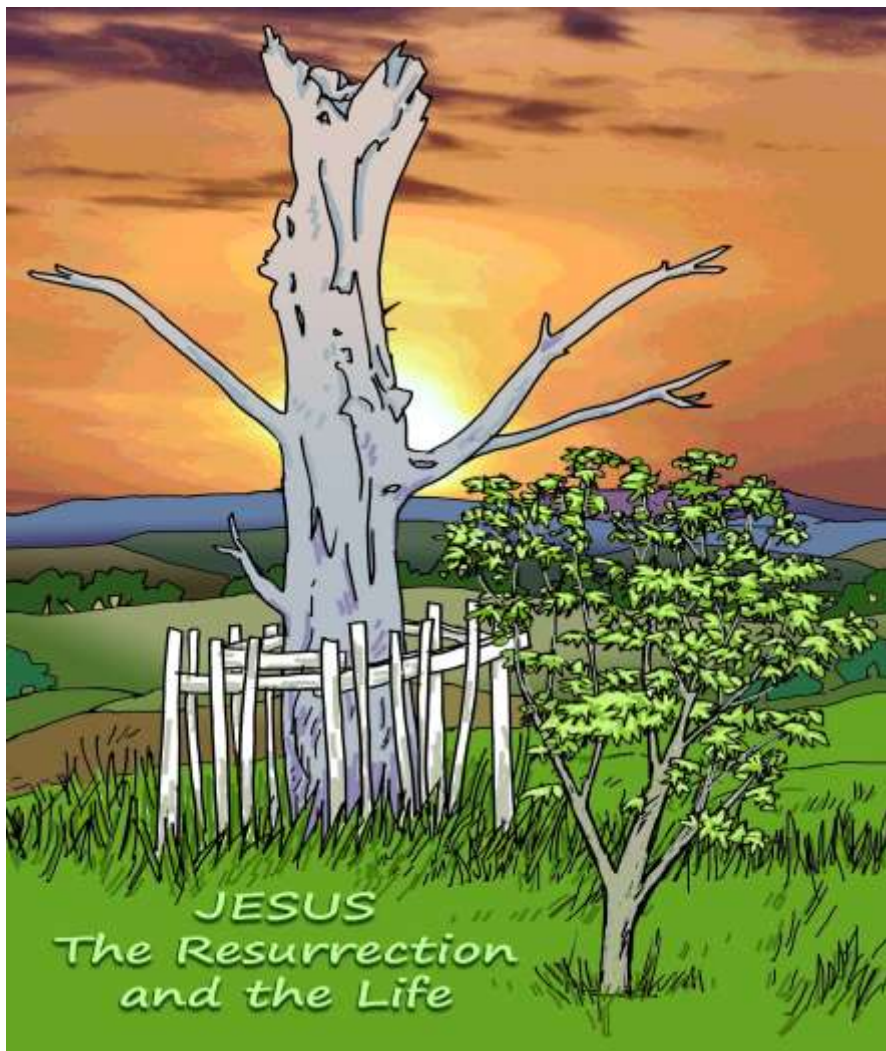

Easter: A Time for New Beginnings

Easter is often associated with church bells, chocolate eggs, and springtime celebrations. For many across the country, it's a bank holiday and a chance to gather with family and enjoy the longer days. But what if Easter could mean something more, even for those who don't regularly attend church or consider themselves religious?



For people of faith, Easter is the time to remember the resurrection of Jesus and the belief that love cannot be defeated, even by death. At its heart, Easter is about renewal — the idea that after every winter, a spring follows. This season encourages us to reflect on our lives, to shed what no longer serves us, and to embrace new possibilities. Whether you observe Easter for its religious significance or simply as a cultural tradition, it's a reminder that hope and new beginnings are always possible.

Richard Rohr, a well-known Franciscan writer and teacher, offers a way of understanding Easter that resonates beyond the walls of the church. Rohr emphasizes that Easter is less about abstract ideas and more about transformation. He says, "Resurrection is not a one-time event; it's the possibility of change and renewal in every moment." This teaching invites everyone — regardless of belief — to see Easter as a time for growth, letting go of old patterns and stepping into a new way of being.



Easter reminds us that even when things seem bleak, there is potential for new life and hope. Whether you're starting a new job, mending a relationship, or simply trying to make sense of the world, the spirit of Easter is relevant.

As well as attending a church service to celebrate Easter, walking through the park to enjoy the spring flowers or sharing a meal with loved ones can be ways to mark the occasion



Easter, as Richard Rohr teaches, is about more than tradition. It's an invitation to see life with fresh eyes, to believe in the possibility of renewal, and to find hope wherever you are. Whether you celebrate with faith, with family, or simply with a walk in the spring sunshine, Easter can be a meaningful time for all.

As the city shakes off the winter chill and embraces brighter days, Easter reminds us that change is possible. In the words of Richard Rohr, "let this be your season of transformation" — however you choose to celebrate it.

Flying visitors – the secrets of bird migration



People have wondered for centuries where some bird species go to in winter. The ancient Greeks thought they turned into fish and the Victorians supposed swallows hibernated in the reed beds of British ponds. The true picture only started to emerge in 1822, when a stork

turned up in Germany with a 30-inch African spear lodged in its neck. Later, in 1929, a cuckoo was ringed in England but sadly ended up in a stew in the Cameroon. The hunter did, however, carefully remove the ring and return it to the UK! We now of course have a much better understanding of bird migration, thanks to the widespread use of bird ringing and more sophisticated GPS tracking devices that can be fitted to all but the smallest birds.



Bird migration is one of Nature's miracles. It is awe-inspiring that some species travel thousands of miles each year over often inhospitable terrain, in some cases without having been shown the way by older birds. They even manage to navigate to precisely the same spot each year: if you've ever watched the Woodland Trust's Loch Arkaig osprey-cam you will know that one bird,



Louis, has made the 45-day journey from Africa to the same nest for the last 9 years. Who doesn't marvel at the screaming of scimitar-winged swifts as they hunt insects in the summer skies and the fact that they live their whole lives on the wing except to lay eggs? And the sight of swallows lining up on telephone wires in September preparing to fly back south for the winter is a reminder that the summer is coming to an end.

An estimated 17 million birds migrate to Britain annually, many to breed. They start to arrive in March, including the aptly named blackcap and the chiffchaff (chiff-chaff is exactly what its call sounds like). The arrival and departure of migratory birds has been monitored for decades now and the data shows the impact of climate change. All our spring migrants are arriving earlier, chiffchaffs for example now appearing 3 weeks earlier than they did as recently as 1999. Sadly, many bird species are declining in numbers. Habitat loss, intensive farming and the spread of desert areas with global warming all contribute. Some birds seem to have all but



disappeared. I recall the distinctive call of the cuckoo every year in my London childhood but I can't remember the last time I heard one here. Interestingly, I have heard them on holiday in the north of England and Scotland. One theory is that those birds take a different migratory route from

Africa, one that is less threatened by climate change than the route used by birds coming to the south of the country.

Some birds are changing their migratory habits. With global warming some are choosing to remain in southern Europe for the winter, rather than risking a perilous journey across the Sahara. Some birds, and blackcaps and chiffchaffs are examples, are even choosing to remain in this country throughout the year. As well as the milder winters it seems that a major draw for the birds is the fact that we nature-loving Brits are particularly good at leaving birdseed and fatballs for them to eat.



The winds of climate change are blowing fast. We have to hope that more and more species can adapt to the changes. We have to change our behaviour too, making our world more accommodating to our migratory birds, and of course to all other species of wildlife. In the meantime, don't forget to top up your birdfeeders and enjoy the spectacle of the different birds that come for a snack.

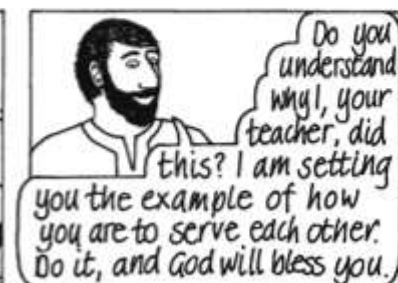
A short story from the Bible

Editor: How post-Easter can be a time of re-commissioning....

Breakfast – with Jesus Christ

“It is the Lord!” (John 21:7) There is something very reassuring in the simple scene by Galilee’s lake, described on that post-Easter morning. Taking place there was the birth of a mighty world-wide adventure that has not ended yet! Was there ever a breakfast like it? They’d been fishing all night, but in vain.... until they heard a distant call from the shore: “How are you doing, guys?”



There is even the little detail in the instructions from the beach that it was to be on the *right* side of the boat that the net should be thrown out this time.

That Stranger. That voice! Suddenly the net was full of wriggling fish. It was like coming in at the start of the film again – (see Luke 5:6). Then Peter’s hundred-yard splash to the shore... the charcoal fire and ‘large’ tilapia fish. Then the typical action of fishermen in counting the catch. How the Bible teems with stories.

And now breakfast on the beach, with Jesus Christ! It was a re-commissioning for the apostle Peter, who only days earlier had denied any knowledge of Jesus. From now on it would be different. “Feed my sheep,” said Jesus.

1. Whose call but Christ’s call? Peter would never be the same again. Those who have truly heard the call of Christ, will still be standing firm when revolutions explode, when finances plunge, when a church falls apart, when a country falls apart.

2. Whose word but Christ’s word? ‘Feed my sheep,’ were His words. Whoever we may be teaching, Christ’s servant is to see to it that what is taught is Christ’s word and not one’s own. The power that brings forgiveness and resurrection life can only come from one source!



3. Whose flock, but Christ’s flock? ‘MY lambs... MY sheep’ – they were never ours! Realise this – and so much of the conflicts that can occur between the friends of Jesus will cease overnight.

Can you smell the tilapia fish grilling on that little fire by Galilee’s beach? The Stranger on the shore is calling YOU. Along with John, dripping wet in the boat, recognise that He is no stranger. “It is the Lord.”

What's the Big Idea?

An Introduction to the Books of the Bible: Leviticus & Numbers

These books are concerned with Israel's wandering in the desert, on their journey from slavery in Egypt to the promised land of Canaan.



Leviticus focuses on the regulations about worship, ceremonial cleanness, moral laws and holy days. The key theme is that of *holiness*, as every detail of our lives is affected by the presence of a holy God. The aim of the sacrifices, feast and Sabbaths was to enable the people to enter God's presence. We should see the instructions and practices in Leviticus as pointing to Jesus. He totally fulfilled the law through the sacrifice of His life, as Easter

reminds us. He demonstrated the love and holiness of God, so that we can share His life: *'Be holy, because I am holy'* (1 Peter 1:16, cf Lev 11:44-45; 19:2; 20:7).



The book of Numbers tells the story of Israel's journey through the wilderness. The people were coming to terms with their *identity* as God's people and the *call* to serve Him. They didn't always respond with faith, gratitude and obedience, but with unbelief, ingratitude and rebellion. As a result of their refusal to enter Canaan (ch 14), they were condemned to spend

the rest of their lives in the desert. However, God in His grace allowed their children to enter the Promised Land. The book reminds us that the Church is called to be a community that honours God, learns how to deal with sin in ourselves and others, and lives out love and justice in daily life.

'The LORD bless you and keep you; the LORD make his face shine upon you and be gracious to you; the LORD turn his face toward you and give you peace.' (Numbers 6:24-26).

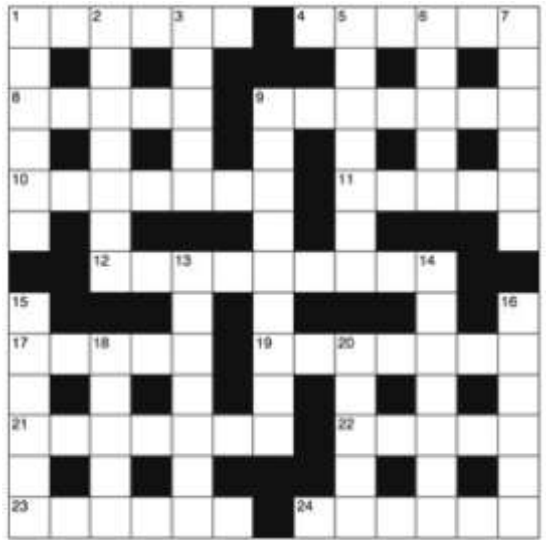

The Beauty of Good Friday

Some of the most beautiful things in the world have an ugly side. What about the emperor penguin chick, nestling in a feathery pouch above its parent's feet? There's a lovely moment when mum and dad greet each other over the gaping beak of their fuzz-ball offspring. Heads bent together, making a heart shape in the air, we can't help seeing a reflection of our own ideals of love in the pair.

But the reality of what those birds are going through is even more gruelling than human parenthood. Father penguin has spent all winter sheltering the egg from freezing hurricane-force winds, while mother penguin was feeding at sea.



When the chick hatched its parents started an exhausting game of tag, taking it in turns to walk across the ice and risk being eaten by leopard seals or killer whales, in order to catch fish for their new offspring.

The living world is truly wonderful in so many ways, but the darker side of the picture is never far away. Creation is groaning (Romans 8:22), and just waiting to be rescued. Enter Jesus, through whom all of Creation was made. The king of the universe came to live with us, bringing His great love and wisdom to the human population of first-century Israel. The Creator was relating to His creation in a very personal way, and this could have been a totally beautiful picture.

But there is a horrifically ugly side of Jesus' story that threatens to obscure the beauty of what He did on Good Friday. It was a brutal and terrifying day when human sinfulness resulted in the Son of God being executed by His enemies, but thankfully there was much more to it than that. The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ set off a seismic wave of spiritual events whose effects are still rippling out across the world.



So that ugly day over 2,000 years ago is called 'good' because of what it achieved. Those who follow Jesus find their lives are changed for the better, even if their day-to-day existence may still be incredibly tough. When people come to understand what Creation is for and who it belongs to, they can begin to serve and preserve the earth as they should. These things are only whispers of what is to come, but they give me hope for the future redemption of all Creation. I can choose to dwell on the beauty of Jesus' death because it was not the end of the story – the future beckons.

I shall hear those words differently this year than ever before. Christ is risen – He is risen indeed!
