## A message from Revd. Malcolm Strange



When choosing the carols for this year's Christmas services I began reflecting on the 19<sup>th</sup> Century writer Christina Rossetti's poem, 'In the Bleak Midwinter' which is now a well-known and much-loved Christmas Carol. I can assure you we will certainly be singing it at all the Carol Service held in the five Fromeside Benefice churches this year for sure.

It seems many years since we had a crisp and frosty winter on the scale of 1947, 1962, 1976, 1982, 1996 and 2010 and even more years since we had a proper White Christmas. The last substantial one was 2010, although 2022 is officially the last one we had as it only needs one flake of snow to land on a UK weather station for it to be officially called a white Christmas.



I guess at the time that Rossetti wrote her poem people were used to harsher winters, after all the Thames used to freeze over, with the Frost Fairs being held on the ice, well into the 19<sup>th</sup> century, during a period that was known as the 'Little Ice Age'.




Whilst global warming is rightly forcing us to reflect on the impacts of severe weather patterns caused by, amongst other things, our excessive use of fossil fuels, the truth is that the real focus of Rossetti's poem is not really the weather at all, but an exploration of the story of Jesus birth, the meaning of the Incarnation and more importantly how we should respond to this eternal truth.

In a world that is in such a mess, with conflicts raging, politicians and leaders taking up extreme and somewhat uncaring positions, with increased poverty and large numbers of people struggling on the margins of society, this carol does bring an extra challenge to us all this Christmas in how we respond and care for each other.





For me the required response is so beautifully captured in the carol's final verse. 'What can I give him poor







At the heart of Christian Values is the call for us to love one another, which is not a bad aspiration for us all whatever our faith, and for the believer, living our lives this way is how we can best give Jesus our hearts.

#### SALEM PAGE

December's issue of the joint magazine always confronts me with a dilemma. I want to say something about Christmas, but also something about the ensuing Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in January, from 18th to 25th.




This year, I see a chance to link the two together. At Christmas, we remember



the coming of the eternal Son of God into our world in all it sad messiness, of which the current troubles in the Holy Land have so vividly reminded us. Born in poverty in a land which was a place of conflict then as now, Jesus also died in it, the victim of its sin and rivalries. And yet, to use Paul's teaching, we believe that 'God was in Christ, reconciling the world to himself'. We celebrate that life in Charles Wesley's words, 'our God contracted to a span, incomprehensibly made man'. We join in Charles' request to 'give

us eyes to see the man transfixed on Calvary and know thee, who thou art, the one eternal God and true'. And we remember

that God has come all the way to meet us and to take our vulnerability to Himself in the most extraordinary act of sacrifice proving that, indeed, 'his mercy is over all his works' (Psalm 145, v9)'.



Next year, 2025, sees the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea, a meeting of three hundred bishops of the early Church, convened to settle complex arguments about the nature of Christ as truly one with us as a human being and also one with God, as partner of the Father and the Holy Spirit from all eternity.

After lengthy discussion, they drew up a document, ever since known as the Nicene Creed (named after the town, now in Turkey, where they had met). This set out the basics of Christian faith in God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit plus an affirmation of the four characteristics of the Church of Christ as one, holy, catholic and apostolic.

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of wen and earth, of all things visible and instable. I believe in Jesus Christ, the only Asyetten Sea of God. Who was convolved by the power of the Holy Spirit and been to a strain named Mary. Whe suffered and was crucified router Presentes Pilet, died and was placed in a much. Who descended into hell and, on the third day, rese again, according to scripture, and surended to housen to sit on the eight hand of God, The Father: From there, He shall come squin in glery to judge both the living and the renand. I believe in one hely Christian church. l'acknewledge baption for the reminion of sins and look ferward to the resurrection of the doad and the life execual that is effected to me Amout

Ever since then, this document has been seen as an agreed statement of the faith of all Christians. Though there have been divisions within the Church since, they have not affected the value placed on this statement of common faith. It is often

recited in the services of the Church, particularly at Communion, but even in those churches where it is not often recited in services, its authority is still respected. The amazing thing is that, despite all the more recent differences, particularly in the fifth, eleventh and sixteenth centuries (this last the period of the Protestant



Reformation), we are all still agreed on the absolute basics which are that we believe in the triune God who envelops us in his all-redeeming love.

If anyone queries this, they will find that they would get the same affirmation, both from the Vatican and from a strict Baptist church of these glorious truths revealed to and believed by the faithful, also, in a myriad of other places

God is the all-forgiving Father who, 'as far as the east is from the west, so far does he remove our transgressions from us' (Psalm 103, v12). He is a father who has compassion on us as his children and his steadfast love is from everlasting to everlasting over those who respect his awesome kindness (Psalm 103, vv13,17). He is also the Son, the captain of our faith, our advocate and intercessor with the Father and in the one in and through whom we receive the fullness of abundant life. Finally, He is the Holy Spirit in and through whom we receive the supreme privilege of adoption, whereby we can pray with the Son, 'Abba, Father', and may know the truth of our call to be the adopted brothers and sisters in Christ of the one Father.



All the churches, Catholic and Orthodox, Anglican, Protestant and free church, Pentecostal and 'new' churches, that accept this same faith are members of the one holy, catholic and apostolic Church, 'built on the foundation of the apostles and

prophets' (Ephesians 2, v 20). Currently, we may be divided on some secondary issues but we all agree on the ultimately key ones.

It is thus our duty to share with each other in fellowship, to learn from each other, to enrich each other in receiving from the one Christ and the one Spirit. It is in the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity that we particularly seek God's guidance as to how, together, we can become most fully the one holy, catholic and apostolic church that He wants us to be.



#### Advent - the season for hope



Advent is the season of hope. For the Jews the hope was for the expected Messiah and for Christians the hope is for the coming of Jesus to transform our lives and the world in which we live. Sometimes this hope seems forlorn, with so many things wrong in our world. There are wars, poverty, injustice and, looming over them all, climate change and the associated environmental degradation threatening the extinction of many species including our own.

The evidence for climate change is piling up. 2024 is on track to be another record breaking year for the average global temperature. Wildfires, hurricanes and flooding are increasingly severe. The ice caps are shrinking, forests are disappearing, deserts are spreading. And the list goes on....





Against this background what hope is there and what can we do about it? In spite of all the difficulties I believe there is hope. #### Almshouse Vacancy



A residence has become available within the Perry Almshouses in Winterbourne, Bristol for anyone who is in need within the Fromeside Benefice (Parishes of Winterbourne, Winterbourne Down, Frampton Cotterell, Iron Acton and Coalpit Heath).

The house is single occupancy and comprises of a lounge, small kitchen and bathroom, an upstairs bedroom with communal laundry and gardens. The successful applicant will be required to pay a monthly maintenance contribution and must be able to live independently.

In accordance with the Trust Deed, applicants must be unable to afford a home of their own; should be 60 years old or over (or if younger, are unable to maintain themselves through ill-health, accident or infirmity); if born within the Parish should have been resident there for not less than five years or if born elsewhere should have been resident for not less than 10 years prior to application; with preference being given to those who are actively involved in a Christian denomination.





#### The Colours of Christmas

There are several colours that we traditionally associate with Christmas. They are green, red, and gold, and to a lesser extent, white and blue.



Green: Evergreen plants like holly, ivy and mistletoe were used for thousands of years to decorate buildings during the long dark winters. The Romans exchanged evergreen branches in January to wish each other good luck. The ancient Egyptians brought palm branches into their home during the mid-winter festivals. In Europe during the Middle Ages, the 'Paradise tree' which figured in plays about the loss of Eden, was normally a pine tree with red apples tied to it.

Red: This is the colour of holly berries, and it reminded people of Jesus' blood when He died on the cross. Red is also the colour of bishops' robes, which is how St Nicholas came to be portrayed wearing red. Red is also the colour of fire, which keep you warm during cold dark nights.



Gold: This is the colour of the Sun and light. It was the present of one of the Wise Men, and traditionally, was the colour of the star over Bethlehem.



White: This is the colour of purity and peace. It is the colour of the altar cloth at Christmas.

Blue: This is the colour of Mary's robe. It is also the colour of the sky and heaven.




