A message from Revd. David Jones

Are you ready for pancakes?

Tuesday 4th March is Shrove Tuesday, more commonly known as pancake day. A day when we treat ourselves to all the stuff we know is no good for us before a period of fasting. Have we ever stopped to think why?

There is a pagan tradition of feasting and fasting before and after the spring equinox. The Hindus celebrate Holi and various other faiths have festivals of celebration with feasting before a time of fasting and reflection.






Shrove Tuesday is often seen as the true start to spring, a time when we use up the fatty winter foods we needed for warmth over the coldest months and a time when the spring produce appears for the next season.

Shrove comes from the practice of shriving, an ancient catholic practice of confessing sin and seeking forgiveness from God.

I am sure many of us will be celebrating, perhaps not as enthusiastically as they do in other parts of world. We will no doubt try to consume our weight in fat and sugar before regretting our excess over the next day or so, or maybe that's just me!

How many of us will use this as a period of change, self-reflection, seeking forgiveness, or marking the start of a period of intentional change? Will we

reflect on the excess of the one day, or will we see this as the start of living less excessively and a chance to see how our living in excess is damaging both to us and to those around us? Perhaps we did this at new year, decided what we would lay aside and what we would begin. Perhaps we have stuck with those commitments or perhaps, two months in, they have long since been forgotten. Did we make commitments that benefit us? Our families? What



about our neighbours? What about those on the far side of the globe? What about those who are yet to come?

The idea of self-reflection and confessing our thoughtlessness and our mistakes is so that we are released from our burdens and that we may turn towards doing good and not harm.



As a follower of Christ, I believe it is about turning away from sin and toward God, as is the belief of most major faiths. But even if you are without a faith, should we not all be seeking the flourishing of all? So, I encourage you to use this spring to consider how you might have a positive impact on the well-being of yourself, your family, your neighbours, on strangers and on those who are yet to be born

Many of us carry around a small bottle of water because of the health benefits of avoiding dehydration. Any liquid helps to maintain body hydration but some are better than others — apparently milk is particularly good, even better than water. Carrying a bottle around also has the benefit of avoiding the cost of a cup of coffee or tea when out and about.





The problem arises when all this water is in single use plastic bottles. It is estimated that 1 million bottles are bought every minute around the globe and this figure is rising. Some 2 billion people around the world with limited

or no access to safe drinking water rely on bottled water. But for the rest of us including the UK, it's largely a matter of convenience and the belief - aided and abetted by industry marketing - that bottled water is safer and often healthier than tap water.

So what does the evidence say?

- In the UK at least, both tap and bottled water has to meet stringent standards for contaminants including bacteria, so both are safe to drink.
- The mineral content of bottled waters is supposed to confer health benefits.
 However, the evidence is that a good healthy diet with plenty of fruit and
 vegetables provides all the minerals we need without the addition of bottled
 water.
- If cost is your concern, then tap water is definitely the better option. At well under 1p per litre it is vastly cheaper than even everyday branded water at typically 50p to £2 per litre.
- Most plastic water bottles are made of PET which is very recyclable and some manufacturers do use recycled plastic. The problem is that a lot of this material ends up in landfill and doesn't get recycled in spite of the recycling facilities now available to us. It is estimated that something like half of all the plastic water bottles in the UK end up in landfill.
- There are health concerns about the degradation products as plastics slowly break down. Water stored in plastic bottles for long periods may leach out harmful chemicals and the breakdown of plastic produces tiny pieces

commonly known as microplastics, which are now found everywhere including most parts of the human body. We don't understand the long-term health effects of these pollutants.

The solution is simple of course. Get a reusable bottle and fill it with tap water when you go out. If you go to a restaurant, opt for the tap water – it is encouraging to see that an increasing number



of places provide this option more readily now. And while you are thinking about it, why not support WaterAid, a charity dedicated to getting safe drinking water to all parts of the world? Their



work helps provide a water supply infrastructure that avoids the need for people to drink bottled water in countries without effective recycling facilities


A short story from the Bible



A Lent Reflection

Somebody asked a Christian friend why he was eating iced buns, when he had given them up for Lent! He answered, 'At the bakers I told God, that if He wanted me to buy iced buns, He should provide a parking space in front. On the eighth time around, there it was!' Rather than seeing Lent simply as a time to give things up, let's use it intentionally for self-examination, reading Scripture, penitence, fasting and prayer.

At Jesus' baptism, God's voice says, 'You are My Son, whom I love; with You I am well pleased.' (Luke 3:22). The Holy Spirit then leads Jesus into the wilderness, where we find Him coming to terms with who He is. Satan's temptations

challenge Jesus in key three areas of His identity: His divine sonship, political power and Messianic role (Luke 4: 1-13). It is as though Jesus was looking into the mirror at Himself to discern what kind of Saviour He should be.

For us, Lent is an opportunity to hold up a mirror to

ourselves and ask the question, 'who am 1?' It's a season of honest encounter with who we are, what we've done, and how we should live. What will we see when we hold up the mirror to ourselves? Keeping Lent, the 40 days running up to Easter, could mean taking time to read Scripture, studying a Christian book or

spending five minutes each day in silence! We might fast by missing one or two meals, refraining from TV, alcohol, social media, or scrolling on our phones. All of these can help us to give more attention to God in our lives.

Whatever we do, Lent is a season for self-reflection, as we put ourselves in a position to receive afresh the forgiveness and healing that God offers.

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



Reflecting Faith: Church Buildings

We have been thinking about different aspects of church buildings. But what about 'the whole thing'? - the impression you have when you first see a church building?

Most of us have visited many church buildings, either to worship or as a tourist: to enjoy the splendour, the colours, the style and the architecture, with or without necessarily a time of prayer or worship.





There are some amazingly staggering designs around the world – one only has to think of the complex and intricate stone carving of Gaudi's catholic basilica in Barcelona, Spain (due to be completed next year!) and then compare that to the sleekness of the Lutheran (Church of Iceland) parish church in Reykjavík, Iceland.

How about the grandeur of St Peter's in Rome, full of baroque gold and rich colours? Or what about St Basil's Cathedral in Red Square, Moscow — now a museum but topped with amazingly coloured onion domes?



Just looking at the outside of a building tells you a lot about what it is likely to be like inside, the purpose of the building and the style of worship to expect there.

It's not just about the condition of the fabric, or the tidiness of the grounds but rather the architecture itself.

When we see a contemporary modern building, we will expect the worship to match it: whether that is Protestant, Catholic or any other denomination.

Bearing fruit takes time

The nine fruits of the Spirit are Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness and Self-Control. We don't strive for the fruits of the Spirit, rather we plant ourselves in good soil, allow ourselves to be fed by the Holy Spirit, keep taking in nourishment, turn to face the light of Christ and these fruits will develop and grow in our lives.

Can you tell whether a tree is an apple tree or a pear tree? Not easily for much of the year, but very easily when they bear fruit. Bearing fruit takes time and a lot of planting, preparation, nurture and growth.



March is the time of year when gardeners begin to plant seeds ready for summer, but patience is needed – the seeds will take a while to germinate, and the gardener needs to write the names of seeds on labels and not forget which are fruit, flowers and vegetables. The seeds need to be in the dark, or the light, or the warmth or the cool, depending at what stage of life they are at.

So too, is God with us. God writes our names on His heart; God knows what fruit we can bring forth. God nurtures us and gives

us light to grow. But first, we need to be planted and that can be scary.

Maybe you are feeling in a cold dark place this March, maybe it feels as if you've been buried, maybe you've got a weight above you and you can't see the way out. Just think that maybe you've been buried because you've been planted.

With patience there will be warmth and light, be like a seed, trust God, and begin to grow out of the darkness towards God's marvellous light. We won't see fruit immediately; we have to be nourished and mature and ripen. Patience will be given to us, fruit of the seed of the Holy Spirit.



The remarkable usefulness of Allen keys

All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work. 2 Timothy 3:16-17

We all need practical skills, and they are not always easily gained.




I seem to spend a lot of time assembling flat pack furniture of one type or another. The trick is to look and sound as though you know what you are doing, even though any skills are gained through trial and error. It is surprising how many household projects require an Allen key, which if you have not seen one, is an L shaped rod with a hexagon end which fits into an identical sized recess in the top of a screw. You can use the longer or shorter arm depending on the job needs extra force or speed.

The idea of a hexagon *socket* screw was probably thought of as early as the 1860s to 1890s, but such screws were not widely manufactured until around 1910. In 1909–1910, William G. Allen also patented a method of screw heads which had a *hexagonal* recessed die. The key that he lent his name to fits nicely into the head of the screw, is cheap and easy to use.



When you are called on to do some DIY, especially after someone has had a go, the best thing is to refer to the instructions and keep all your Allen keys together in one place so you can easily find them. They come in different sizes.







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
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
