

A message from Revd. Julia Chard

A well-known fact is that music of all types can lift the soul, and is good for our well being.

I do not profess to have any musical talent, apart from happily shaking a tambourine, beating a drum to a rhythm, 'tinging' a triangle, and singing along to a tune - admittedly with far from a chorister's voice! I have to say though that my voice was quite acceptable at the Singing for the Brain group that I attended with my mum some years ago, and those ditties still ring in my mind! If we use Christian words, music can sound like a heavenly symphony, where every sound enhances the overall effect.





A quote from the late Desmond Tutu- describes this perfectly. There is a chap at the back carrying a triangle. Now and again the conductor will point at him, and he will play a 'ting'. That might sound insignificant but something irreplaceable would be lost to the total beauty of the symphony if that 'ting' did not happen. We may feel that we have a small position in Christianity, but everyone of us matters - matters to God, and to the plan he has here on earth. Never forget you are special!

Yes, we are all special – even if at times we become downhearted or feel distant or insignificant. Thinking of the last night at the Proms, it is important that the **'ting' is there in the symphony. Without that one sound the magic would fall flat** and the music lose its impact.

Music chosen at funerals is another example of how important the final symphony of a person's life is and how it seeks to celebrate their worthy presence whilst on earth. **Popular choices are Frank Sinatra singing 'My Way'** and meaningful hymns Amazing Grace, Love Divine or Lord of all hopefulness. Other choices are Sarah Brightman singing 'Time to say goodbye.' 'Simply the best' sung by Tina Turner and the



melodious voice of Elvis recalling special memories of time gone by. Finally, there's Celine Dion and 'my heart goes on' (even though it reminds me of Titanic and a sinking ship). So, the list goes on attempting to describe a vibrant personality or a humbler quiet soul.

I recall, at recent funeral of someone who was guiet yet had a good sense of humour, listening to a different expression of melody - a comedy recording from Laurel and Hardy entitled 'Another fine mess you got me into.' This was chosen by the deceased as a loving description of words often spoken in a humorous way. It was a 'ting' moment among others in the funeral which concluded with 'Bring me sunshine' sung by Morecombe and Wise!





These songs and many more give a 'ting' to the memory of a loved one, some who may not have reached the pinnacle of their ambitions or potential but they have importance in the family, and are an example of a full life in preparation for eternity. Because we need to celebrate difference, funerals should include that 'ting' and no piece should dismissed as irreverent and guickly swept away as though it does not matter any longer.

Music can be enchanting and uplifting, can touch our senses and bring us closer to God - even on those dark days.... So, "always look on the bright side of life" as Eddie Idle sang!

Never forget you are special.

about Christian discipleship and activity in the wider community.



Keeping warm – cheaply



The nights are drawing in and the temperature is dropping. Many people will be concerned about keeping warm this winter and the associated costs. The withdrawal of the automatic winter fuel allowance for pensioners has highlighted this problem for older people in particular. However, there are things that can help and here are some ideas:

Firstly, although the automatic winter fuel allowance has been stopped, there are many people who still qualify for it if they are on benefits of some form. Apparently, there are getting on **for a million people in this category who don't currently claim.** If you think you might be eligible, please look on the government website https://www.gov.uk/winter-fuel-



payment/eligibility or phone 0800 731 0160 for guidance. Your local citizen's advice bureau should be able to help too.

There are plenty of things you can do at home to reduce those energy bills too and they cost nothing:



- Turn down the thermostat by a degree or so
- Turn off the heating in unused rooms and shut the doors
- Turn down or turn off the heating overnight
- Close the blinds or curtains
- Turn off the heating when you're out
- Make sure the doors and windows don't let in draughts





- Make sure you only put the amount of water you need in the kettle – boiling a kettle-full of water for a cup of tea is very wasteful
- Reduce the amount of hot water you use don't stay in the shower too long, don't run the hot water continuously when you are washing up

Modern LED lights are much more efficient than the traditional filament bulbs, but it is nevertheless helpful to turn them off when you **don't need them. It also saves energy not to** leave the TV and other electronic devices on standby. It is surprising how much energy these things use when they are left on all the time.





And how about sharing a cup of tea or coffee with a friend, taking it in turns to act as host so you only have to heat one house at a time? As well as saving money, the company is good for the spirits and will help you keep warm psychologically.

War and Peace



John Lennon wrote: 'Imagine there's no countries, It isn't hard to do, Nothing to kill or die for, And no religion too. Imagine all the people living life in peace.' But on Remembrance Sunday, we should reflect on war past and present, and consider the real way to peace.

The way of war: 'What causes fights and quarrels among you? Don't they come from your desires that battle within you? You desire but do not have, so you kill.' (James 4:1-2). James reminds us that war has its basis in our own hearts, with the selfish desires that exploit, bully and kill others to get our own way. Sadly, when nations allow these inner selfish attitudes to determine their policy the result is war. Only God can establish true peace.

The way of peace: Isaiah, 2,700 years before John Lennon, also imagined a future of peace without any war: *'They will beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore.'* (Isaiah 2:4).

Only Jesus, the Prince of Peace, can bring true peace to our lives and world. Jesus did not experience the horror of battle, but He did die an horrific death at the hand of the Romans. He gave His life sacrificially, as **He took God's anger at our sin on Himself and went** on to conquer death in His resurrection. He did this out of love for us, and calls us to love others in the same way: *'Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends.'* (John 15:13).



How can we demonstrate such love ourselves? We can be confident in God's plan to bring an end to all wars when Jesus returns.



What does 'cosy crime' have to show us?

Richard Osman, game-show-host-turned-best-selling novelist, writes books in the genre called 'cosy crime'.

In these stories, a murder has been committed and a sleuth sets out to discover whodunnit. But this isn't gritty noir. There's usually a pleasant rural setting and an amateur detective, and the bloodless murder is rarely dwelt upon. Most importantly, there's a satisfying conclusion in which the mystery is solved, and justice is served. Osman even speaks about the 'humour and warmth' in his writing – terms not commonly associated with crime.

In a world full of violence, where headlines and TV series alike feature unfathomable crimes, perhaps it's little wonder we're drawn to their cosier counterparts. Osman's stories, and those like them, offer us a version of reality in which order defeats chaos, mysteries can be solved, crimes are met with punishments, and justice triumphs.

It is, of course, God's ultimate justice that motivates our desire for stories that provide resolution. We all long for the perfect combination of comfort and vengeance – and this can only come from the God who hates wrongdoing and loves justice (Isaiah 61:8).



Osman's heroes are a group of pensioners living in an upmarket retirement village. So cosy crimes show us that even the least of us can be part of putting things right.



Few of us will become sleuths, but we can all embed ourselves in our local communities and, through attentiveness, prayer, and discernment, recognise areas of injustice. Indeed, we are both the **agents and the beneficiaries of God's plan to bring good news,** freedom, restoration, & joy to our world (Isaiah 61:1–6).

So, this Christmas-tide, can you slow down and pay attention long enough to see **what's really bothering that friend, colleague, or neighbour? When you read the** news headlines, will you pray for justice and mercy to triumph? Or perhaps humour and warmth could change the tone of a conversation this week. In each **of these situations, you're living as a sign of God's kingdom** – a kingdom that is far from cosy, but that meets the deepest cravings of our crime-consumed culture.



Year 6 have made a fabulous start back to their final year at primary school. We have been reading the story 'The Last Alchemist' in English and will be writing our first story next week. In Maths, we have been securing the four operations and getting to grips with the tricky arithmetic that Year 6 brings.

We have already completed some fabulous artwork – recreating the Water Lilies painting by Claude Monet. We used different brush techniques and colour mixing to paint our impressions. We learnt that impressionism was about interpretation and not about creating a perfect image of what we see. Here are some of our amazing, finished pieces.
