# A message from Revd. Malcolm Strange

All change platform one! We have a new government and the new MPs have been sworn into parliament - it takes three days once the speaker has been hauled into place for all the niceties to be completed. I am told that we now have the most 'Godless Parliament' in history with forty per cent of MP's making a secular affirmation rather than a religious one. This is of course broadly in line

with national data with 42 per cent of the population saying they do not believe in a divine being (God) and 53 per cent declaring no religious affiliation or membership. We have come a long way since 1888 when the first openly atheistic MP Charles Bradlaugh, was barred from taking his seat because he would not swear the oath of allegiance to God.



The papers tell me in the light of this latest evidence of religious decline that there is a sense of rejoicing in humanist circles, as Christianity continues to circle the wagons and face up to what might be its last stand. I have never quite grasped this rabidity and desire amongst some 'Humanists' to dance on the grave of organised religion and particularly in the UK Christianity.

As well as being a Priest I am also a qualified RE Teacher and have always advocated the importance of valuing and teaching the Humanist position in the courses I have delivered in the classroom. I have always admired their desire to promulgate the best qualities to be found in the human condition, promoting key values that can help society to be a better place for us all. Like many Christians, I have to a degree reflected this in my own ministry being focused on our human talents, gifts and strengths as much as on divine deliverance. To be honest there is something quite incarnational in all this.

What saddens me is that sometimes Humanists can come across as just as fundamentalist as some of the religious positions, beliefs and practices they challenge and seek to eradicate. This is a shame given that one of the greatest of human strengths is the desire to understand others and value them as human beings.

In my experience of working with young people and families it is clear, that adherence to an organised faith position is very much in decline. The one thing which is not though, is the reality that most humans are very spiritual beings and awareness of this is, actually, on the rise as greater numbers engage with and explore the spiritual side of their nature.

Perhaps it is in this spiritual oneness, that both non-religious and religious people might find a common denominator to help us all to live better lives and enhance our understanding of each other, thus, enabling the communities in which we live to be built on the firm foundations of love and care for all.

#### SALEM PAGE

In the July Salem page I said that, whatever the result of the election there might be some surprising results in individual constituencies. That proved to be the case. Despite winning a huge victory, the Labour Party also lost a few seats, one to the Greens, three in constituencies with a high number of Muslims who were not happy the party's views on Gaza, and another to Jeremy Corbyn, who stood as





an independent against the official Labour candidate. All these must give our new Labour government cause for thought. Perhaps the most significant is the loss to the Greens, a party that is particularly influential amongst the younger generation for the obvious reason that they will have to live longer with excessive global warming than the rest of us.

I suspect we were all very distressed by the extraordinary degree of violent rioting in the wake of the election and the appalling killing of the three little girls in Southport. I fear that both racism, especially against the Muslim community, and a sense of deprivation in some particularly poor communities, played a part in this.



Our new government faces a severe challenge. It has rightly decided that the courts must act vigorously against rioters prepared to use violence, but it also needs urgently to address the growing gap between those adequately well off and richer and the minority of the population unable to afford even the sheer necessities of life.

In one sense, the Government is hemmed in by its promises not to raise taxes. I think there is no alternative but to follow the suggestion I would make. First, for about two years, the Government will be able to do little - it must keep its election promises and prove its honesty thereby. However, the Prime Minister and Chancellor should then consider a new election, saying that the only



way we can deal with the poverty at the bottom of our society is by spending far more to help people gain the necessities in housing, food and fuel. This would involve higher taxes, especially for those on well above average incomes.

The Government should spell out the likely cost and put the question as a moral question. How far are we prepared in the UK to display real community in helping the poor minority out of poverty? We should remember that, In God's eyes, a nation is only great when it lives out its responsibility to the poorest and most marginalised. It is the vocation not just of Christians to work for such as society but also of Jews and Muslims. Remember that the



Old Testament prophets denounced neglect and exploitation of the poor, remember too that Islam also highly commends giving to and aiding the poor.

The next two years or so will be very testing for Keir Starmer's Government and they will need courage to address the underlying issues at a further election. How we as electors respond, how we prioritise the needs of the poorest, will be serious moral test for all of us.

#### The seasons are changing



The seasons aren't what they used to be. Perhaps not surprising, since we've just had the warmest year on record globally. People who live in Earth's middle latitudes are accustomed to a spring, summer, autumn and winter. We're in the northern hemisphere, and you may have noticed plants flowering earlier than usual. It's not your imagination: a 2022 study revealed that spring blooms are arriving a month sooner in the UK due to climate change.

Most species can't coordinate their activities around a date and time. Plants, the

bedrock of most ecosystems, stay up to date by paying close attention to changes in light and temperature. They are among the first to know when the days shorten in autumn, and they start to make chemical changes that cause deciduous trees shed their leaves and grow tough winter buds that are resistant to frost. In the same way, temperature tells many plants when to start growing in the spring.





That's where climate change has complicated things: rising air temperatures have yielded shorter, milder winters. Since 1986, plants in the UK now greet spring 26 days earlier, on average. This relatively rapid shift has severed an arrangement plants and animals have negotiated over


thousands of years. Insects that are used to feasting on Aprilflowering plants may find themselves arriving a month late if warmer temperatures mean that the plants now flower in March. The plants themselves suffer too because many rely on insects to pollinate them. Hungry bugs are bad enough but if insects are emerging too late to visit expectant flowers then it's the entire ecosystem that suffers. For example, the birds of European oak woods, such as the blue tit, great tit and pied flycatcher rely on caterpillars to feed their young. The caterpillars are trying to



keep up with the earlier flowers and then the birds are desperately trying to keep up with the earlier caterpillars. But for every ten-day advance in caterpillar emergence, the birds are only able to bring forward their egg laying by three to five days, so they end up being too late. One example of the effects of this is a huge reduction in the pied flycatcher population in the Netherlands.

In the same way as it causes earlier springs, climate change also leads to later autumns. But we don't just get seasons where everything happens either a month earlier or later. Some species will delay hibernation and emerge in spring sooner, but others will stick to their original schedule, taking their cues from day length rather than temperature.

The result will be chaos and many well established food chains will be at risk of breakdown. The mismatch between flowering and insect emergence will also have an impact on agriculture, since many of the crops grown for human consumption rely on insects for pollination.



There is much we still don't understand about climate change. But what is clear is that species and ecosystems, already weakened by habitat destruction, overharvesting, invasive species and pollution, face a major new threat. If we are to preserve the living planet and avoid the extinction of many species we need to do more than just stop climate breakdown. We need to invest in conservation too, to help wild plants and animals adapt to the changes we've already locked in. Not doing so would be bad news for all of us.





#### Let's run with perseverance

'Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race that is marked out for us.' (Hebrews 12:1)

With the Paris Olympics still so recent, this imagery can really speak to us. The Christian is like a highly trained athlete, and the surrounding 'stadium' is filled with champions and heroes of the past; they watch PARIS 2024 US - and we draw inspiration from THEM.

Because we are in training spiritually, it is obvious that every 'sin' is to be treated in the same way as by a modern athlete - for whom drug-taking, indeed any form of cheating or breaking the rules, is out!



But Christ's athletes are also to be careful to shun 'everything that hinders.' The wrong running shoes? A faulty diet? In the Christian's case, if the problem area is not an actual sin, what is it? Why, it is anything that, while in itself legitimate, nevertheless is a weak point, and 'hinders' progress.

The artist Rubens in the 17<sup>th</sup> century created a painting of Thetis - the mother of Achilles in Greek mythology – dipping her son into the supposedly protective waters of the river Styx. But, because she held him by his heel, this single part of him was untouched by the water. Achilles grew to be a mighty warrior; yet, during a fateful battle, an arrow that pierced his vulnerable heel was the means of his downfall.



The Achilles heel factor affects every single one of us. There comes a moment when those who mean business with Jesus Christ become aware that the Holy Spirit is quietly speaking within: "You're blocking the blessing in your life at this weak spot of yours.... by holding onto this object... by entertaining this objective... by persisting in this relationship... by continuing this activity. Let it go."

What is this 'thing'? No one else can spell it out for us. It is between us and Christ alone. There need be no sudden crisis, no emotional surge. But the thing that 'hinders' is firmly – deliberately – to be discarded; no longer to have any part in our Christian living. And the sunshine of heaven smiles down upon us as we run on....


