

### Time to agree on the plastic waste problem?



By the time you read this an international committee will have finished its deliberations and with luck come to some sort of agreement on how to manage the ever-growing problem of plastics pollution. UN committee INC5.2 has been meeting in Geneva in August and was charged with getting a legally binding agreement among all the nations of the world.

The problem of plastics pollution is now widely recognised and accepted as an

important issue. However, views on how to deal with it differ. Logically, many believe that part of the solution has to be to tackle the problem at source, by not producing so much plastic in the first place. But not surprisingly the plastics manufacturers don't like this approach and would rather see all the effort go into recycling. I've written about the issues several times in these articles and there are many aspects for what is a very complex subject.





Plastics come in many varieties serving a wide range of different purposes, making them so convenient to use. But this variety makes it much more difficult to deal with them when they are no longer required. They are very durable too, but this means they are long-lasting and don't degrade in the environment at all readily, unlike natural substances such as paper and wood. When

they do degrade, they tend to produce tiny pieces of so-called microplastics which get literally everywhere: they are found in the deepest oceans, in our rivers and soils, even in our own bodies. They have even been found in developing foetuses in the womb, accentuating concerns about the health effects of compounds that can leach out of the tiny particles. We are told not to reuse plastic bottles for precisely this reason.

Many things have been done to try to reduce the problem. We are told to reduce, reuse and recycle, many single use plastic bags have been banned, kerbside recycling waste collections are widespread but still the waste mountain grows. And sadly, like many problems, it simply gets exported because it's seen as too difficult to deal with it ourselves. And who suffers? As usual, it's the poorer parts of the world,



where there are not the facilities to deal with waste disposal issues. One of the worst aspects is the huge amount of waste from the fast fashion industry. This results in vast quantities of perfectly usable clothing being discarded and being dumped abroad on the promise of recycling which doesn't in practice happen.

In response to this sorry picture Tearfund, the Christian charity, has been campaigning for many years for ways to tackle the problems create in developing



countries, including work to develop a global plastics treaty. As part of this campaign, they have asked people to pray for a successful outcome to the Geneva conference. They sent a delegation to Geneva to present the arguments for urgent agreement. Perhaps you could pray too, support Tearfund financially and continue to do the right thing yourself, doing what you can to reduce your own contribution the plastic waste problem.

PS Sadly, as we go to press, I have to report that no agreement on a treaty to manage the plastics mountain was reached. There were irreconcilable points of view on how to proceed. So, as further work continues in the background to strengthen the arguments and lobby reluctant parties on the need for action, please continue to do your bit, praying for progress, reducing your plastic footprint and pressing those in power to push harder.

### Reflecting Faith: Saying 'Hello'

I'd like to consider some key moments in our church services and start at the very beginning.... Just saying hello!

How do you say 'hello' to the people you meet? We don't use the same words, gestures and tone to each person, nor on each occasion.

When we meet a very senior person in our workplace; we tend to be deferential and formal. By the time we have worked together for some months, we will still hold them in high regard and with respect, but we are probably more relaxed in their presence.





As for members of our close family, there's a time for huge hugs and explosions of laughter, such as at the arrivals desk of the airport, but such a greeting is probably not so appropriate when we meet them in a formal restaurant for lunch.

So it is on a Sunday morning, when we meet with the members of our church in the setting of a church service.

By meeting together for worship, we have come deliberately into a consciousness of God's presence. It's not that He hasn't been with us on the way there, but this is a specific and intentional thing.

So, when the person leading the service says 'hello' at the start of the service, they are not just welcoming you as an individual but rather acknowledging that we are meeting together in the presence of God, to worship Him.

### The Nicene Creed: Who is God?

'We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.'

2025 sees the 1700th anniversary of the Nicene Creed as we saw in the June magazine. We use it at Communion services, but how much notice do we take of the words? In this new series we are looking at what it means to believe in God as Trinity.

**We believe:** In Greek, the Creed begins 'we believe' (in Latin, 'I believe.'). It was formulated at the time of Arius, who declared that Jesus was the first and greatest of God's creatures, but not the same as God the Father. His teaching proved so damaging that the Emperor Constantine called an ecumenical council in Nicaea (AD 325) to clarify the core beliefs for all Christians.



*in one God:* We believe in a God who is both one and Trinity: 'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one' (Deuteronomy 6:4). He is the Old Testament God, who we know through the life and work of Jesus and the Holy Spirit. We are to worship Him alone and not people or things.

the Father, the Almighty: God is both the almighty Creator and loving Father: 'Our Father in heaven, hallowed be Your name' (Matt 6:9). Although the Father of all that exists, He is specifically Father to those who His children through their faith in Jesus.


maker of heaven and earth: God comes before anything that was created, and Creation is His alone: 'In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty' (Genesis 1:1,2). The implication is that He created 'ex nihilo' ie out of nothing. He is one God who is unchangeable, lacking in nothing and the source of all that exists.

of all that is, seen and unseen: God did not just create the physical universe, but also the spiritual powers: 'For in Him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things have been created through Him and for Him.' (Colossians 1:16). Reality is more than what we can see, smell, taste, touch or measure.

The Creed establishes the 'big picture' of who God is and challenges our commitment to Him. How do these opening words of the Nicene Creed speak to us today?






### A message from Revd Julia Chard

written before the summer holidays but just as relevant today

There is a famous saying – never judge a book by its cover! So, apart from the images and author on the cover, what constitutes an enjoyable book? I like to read something recommended which challenges me to immerse into the story and leaves me not wanting to put it down! I wonder who would admit to reading the last page to know the outcome- when only halfway through the book!

In the holiday season, many of us take time to relax – whether in faraway places or in the garden, even a swimming pool to cool down in a heat wave!

For me this summer, my holiday read is on hold because of eye surgery -so I am still anxiously wondering 'who done it' in my latest fictional read of murder and mystery.





This time out for me from reading my chosen novel, made me consider how much our lives are like an open book with blank pages. The question is how those pages can bring fulfilment and riches when life does not go the way we planned it. We might prefer to (shut and) tightly close our eyes to the reality, which

cause distress to people around us. We should understand that there are bound to be mysteries to unravel, as we venture outside of our comfort zones taking on a new hobby, joining a new group to meet different people, or facing a new reality.


